FIXED INCOME FUND

Following discussions held at meetings on June 17-18, 2020, August 13, 2020, September 17-18, 2020 and September 23, 2020, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the Trust unanimously approved an Agreement and Plan of Reorganization (the "Plan") for the reorganization of Highland Total Return Fund and Highland Fixed Income Fund (each a "Target Fund" and collectively, the "Target Funds") with and into the First Foundation Total Return Fund and First Foundation Fixed Income Fund, respectively (the "Acquiring Funds" and, together with the Target Funds, the "Funds"), each newly created series of The Advisors' Inner Circle Fund III ("AIC III"), with the Acquiring Funds being the surviving funds for accounting and performance purposes (each a "Reorganization" and, together, the "Reorganizations"). Under the Plan, the Target Funds would be reorganized into the Acquiring Funds on or around December 14, 2020 (the "Closing Date").

Upon the recommendation of the Highland Capital Management Fund Advisors, L.P. ("HCMFA"), the investment advisor to Highland Total Return Fund and Highland Fixed Income Fund (each a "Fund", and together the "Funds"), the Board of Trustees of the Trust has approved the conversion of the Funds' Class C Shares into Class Y Shares and the subsequent termination of the Funds' Class C Shares. The Funds' Class C Shares will be converted into Class Y Shares on or about November 16, 2020 (the "Effective Date") and the Class C Shares will be terminated thereafter.

ACCESS TO INSTITUTIONALLY MANAGED FIXED INCOME

The Fund seeks to provide maximum income consistent with prudent investment management and the preservation of capital.

- A total return strategy combining top-down positioning with fundamental, bottom-up issue selection managed within a disciplined risk framework
- The Fund invests primarily in a variety of investment-grade debt securities, such as
 mortgage-backed securities, corporate bonds, U.S. Government Securities and
 money market instruments. The Fund normally has a weighted average maturity of
 approximately 5 to 10 years

- Long-term investment horizon

SALES CHARGES

Class A Max Sales Charge: 4.25%. Class C Contingent Deferred Sales Charge ("CDSC") is 1% within the first year from each purchase. Performance results reflect the contractual waivers and/or reimbursements of fund expenses by the Advisor. Absent this limitation, performance results would have been lower. The Advisor has contractually agreed to limit the total annual operating expenses (exclusive of distribution and/or service (12b-1) fees, taxes, such as deferred tax expenses, dividend expenses on short sales, interest payments, brokerage commissions and other transaction costs, acquired fund fees and expenses and extraordinary expenses (collectively, the "Excluded Expenses")) of the Fund (the "Expense Cap"). The Expense Cap will continue through at least January 31, 2021.

RISK CONSIDERATIONS

Asset and Mortgaged-Backed Securities Risk. The risk of investing in asset or mortgaged-backed securities, and includes interest rate risk, prepayment risk and the risk that the Fund could lose money if there are defaults on the loans underlying these securities. Credit Risk. The risk that the Fund could lose money if the issuer or guarantor of a fixed income security, or the counterparty of a derivatives contract or repurchase agreement, is unable or unwilling (or is perceived to be unable or unwilling) to make a timely payment of principal and/or interest, or to otherwise honor its obligations. The Fund's ability to invest in high-yield debt securities generally subjects the Fund to greater risk than securities with higher ratings. Derivatives Risk. Derivatives, such as futures and options, are subject to the risk that changes in the value of a derivative may not correlate perfectly with the underlying asset, rate or index. Derivatives also expose the Fund to the credit risk of the derivative counterparty. Derivative contracts may expire worthless and the use of derivatives may result in losses to the Fund. Foreign and Emerging Markets Risk. The Fund may invest in foreign and emerging market securities which involves certain risks such as currency volatility, political and social instability and reduced market liquidity. High Yield Securities Risk. The risk that high yield securities or unrated securities of similar credit quality (commonly known as "junk bonds") are more likely to default than higher rated securities. Interest Rate Risk. The risk that fixed income securities will decline in value because of changes in interest rates. Barclays Capital U.S. Aggregate Bond Index is an unmanaged, market value weighted index of investment-grade debt issues, including government, corporate, asset-backed and mortgage-backed securities, with maturities of more than 1 year. Unlike the Fund, the index is not an investment, does not incur fees or expenses, and is not professionally managed. It is not possible to invest directly in the index.

² **Risk Statistics:** Risk Statistics are based on Class Y monthly returns for the 5-year period, through the date of this fact sheet. Benchmark risk measures are calculated in relation to the Bloomberg Barclay's U.S. Aggregate Bond Index. **Standard Deviation** measures the volatility of the Fund's returns. Higher standard deviation represents higher volatility. **Alpha** is a measure of performance on a risk-adjusted basis. Alpha takes the volatility (price risk) of a mutual fund and compares its risk- adjusted performance to a benchmark index. The excess return of the fund relative to the return of the benchmark index is a fund's alpha. **Beta** measures the Fund's sensitivity to market movements; beta greater than 1 is more volatile than the market; beta less than 1 is less volatile than the market. **Upside/Downside Capture Ratio** shows you whether a given fund has outperformed-gained more or lost less than-a broad market benchmark during periods of market strength and weakness. An upside capture ratio over 100 indicates a fund has generally outperformed the benchmark during periods of positive returns for the benchmark. Meanwhile, a downside capture ratio of less than 100 indicates that a fund has lost less than its benchmark in periods when the benchmark has been in the red. If a fund generates positive returns, however, while the benchmark declines, the fund's downside capture ratio will be negative (meaning it has moved in the opposite direction of the benchmark).

³ Ratings are measured on a scale that generally ranges from AAA (highest) to D (lowest). The rating categories reflected are issued by Standards and Poor's, a Nationally Recognized Statistical Rating Organization ("NRSRO"). The ratings used were those for the specific position or debt issuer held in the Fund as of the date of this fact sheet. Quality ratings reflect the credit quality of the underlying positions in the fund portfolio and not the fund itself. A fund's portfolio and composition is subject to change.
